**SUMMARY:** Ramirez was born at Castolon but raised at Terlingua, where his grandfather and father worked in the mines. He began work as a seasonal employee for the National Park Service in 1948, eventually gaining permanent status until his retirement from the service. He also worked extensively in the park for private contractors building roads and bridges. He worked on the Tornillo Creek bridge near Rio Grande Village.

He recalls his childhood and education at Terlingua, relating that he earned money by delivering meals to miners. He was involved in the rescue and recovery of several hikers, climbers and tourists stranded in the park. He was a member of the Park Service crew that hand-carried three-inch water pipe to Oak Springs (near the Window) for construction of a water supply system to the Chisos Lodge and basin area.

He recalls the destruction by the Park Service of pre-park ranch homes and other structures. He was involved in construction of Panther Junction and Rio Grande Village, where he helped plant 1900 trees.
